

DISCOVERING MY MINISTRY



IDENTIFYING MY UNIQUE S.H.A.P.E.

We've prepared and adapted several tools to help you discover and think through the five factors that make up who you are. You will complete these on your own (as homework for Sessions 2 and 3) before you meet with a Ministry Guide.

•	" My Gift" (pp. 10-15) will give you an overview of spiritual gifts and help you identify the gifts you may have been given by God.
•	" My Heartbeat" (pp. 16-19) will help you clarify what you really love to do.
•	" My Abilities" (pp. 20-22) will help you appreciate the natural talents and vocational skills you have.
•	" My Personality" (pp. 22-23) will help you see how your God-given temperament can best be used in ministry.
•	" My Experiences" (pp. 24-25) will help you review your history to discover how God has prepared you for a unique ministry that only you can fulfill.

Remember:

- 1. Have fun! These are not "tests"! There are no right or wrong answers. The purpose is to show how you are a unique blend!
- 2. Each one is self-evaluating. No one is "rating" you on this. We're interested in *your* feelings, not others' feelings. However, if may be helpful to ask for additional input from those closest to you after you've filled in your own responses.
- 3. The value of each of these tools will vary depending on your age, how long you've been a Christian, your background, your honesty, and how much time and serious thinking you're willing to invest in them.
- 4. Watch for the symbol. As you complete each S.H.A.P.E. tool, **transfer your results** to the form "Personal Profile: My S.H.A.P.E. for Ministry." You will bring this profile with you to your interview with a ministry guide.

"Now about spiritual gifts... I do not want you to be ignorant." (1 Corinthians 12:1 NIV)

Spiritual gift: a special ability, given by the Holy Spirit to every believer at his or her conversion, to be used to minister to others and thereby build up the Body of Christ.

1. Don't confuse *gifts* with natural *talents*.

- 2. Don't confuse gifts with the fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23).
 - Fruit shows your maturity.
 - Gifts show your ministry.

- 3. Don't confuse *gifts* with Christian *roles*.
- 4. Be aware of the "gift projection" tendency (expecting others to serve the way you do and have similar results).
- 5. Don't feel that your gift makes you superior to others. (1 Corinthians 12:21)
- 6. Realize that using your gifts without love is worthless!

THREE WAYS GOD WANTS YOU TO USE YOUR SPIRITUAL GIFTS:

- 1. Through an ongoing ministry
- 2. Through short-term projects
- 3. Through spontaneous situations

It's easier to discover your gift through ministry than to discover your ministry through your gift.

SHAPE TOOL 1: Unwrapping My Spiritual Gifts

The Bible does not lock us into tight restrictions as to the number of spiritual gifts—or even as to their definitions. The four major lists of gifts are found in Romans 12:3-8; 1 Corinthians 12:1-11, 27-31; Ephesians 4:11-12; and 1 Peter 4:9-11. But there are other passages that mention or illustrate gifts not included in these lists.

As you read through this list, check the box that indicates your initial impression concerning yourself. Remember that you can have many gifts.

1. This gift is for personal edification, not for the whole church.
"He who speaks in a tongue edifies himself, but he who prophesies edifies the church." (1 Corinthians 14:4 NIV)
2. We are to focus on building up others, not ourselves.
"Unless you speak intelligible words you will just be speaking into the air try to excel in gifts that build up the church." (1 Corinthians 14:9, 12 NIV)
3. This gift confuses unbelievers in the service.

SHAPE TOOL 2: Monitoring My Heartbeat



Definition of heart:

- The organ that pumps your blood
- b. Your emotional constitution or disposition
- c. The vital force or driving impulse

The Bible uses the term *heart* to represent the center of motivation, desires, and inclinations.

"Delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart." (Psalm 37:4 NIV)

My heart determines:

• Why I say the things I say.

"The mouth speaks what the heart is full of." (Matthew 12:34 GNT)

• Why I feel the way I feel.

"The Word of God... exposes the very thoughts and motives of a man's heart." (Hebrews 4:12 JBP)

Why I act the way I act.

"...guard your heart, for it is the wellspring of life." (Proverbs 4:23 NIV)

MY HEART IS THE REAL ME!

Physiologically, each of us has a unique heartbeat. Each person has a slightly different pattern. Likewise, God has given each of us a unique emotional "heartbeat" that races when we encounter activities, subjects, or circumstances that interest us. We instinctively feel deeply about some things and not about others.

This God-given motivation serves as an internal guidance system for our lives. It determines what your interests are and what will bring you the most satisfaction and fulfillment. It also motivates you to pursue certain activities, subjects, and environments.

Why has God given each person a unique "heartbeat"?

"God has put it into their hearts to accomplish his purpose..."

(Revelation 17:17 NIV)

God had a purpose in giving you your inborn interests. In fact, your emotional heartbeat reveals a very important key to understanding God's design and intention for your life.

The Bible makes very clear that your heart was designed by God, but you make the choice to use it for good or evil, for selfish purposes or for service.

You may have...

"....selfish ambition in your hearts."

(James 3:14 NIV)

Or you may...

" \...Serve the Lord with all your hearts.""

(1 Samuel 12:20 NIV)

"[Do] the will of God from your heart."

How can I do God's will and serve God's purpose? By letting my heartbeat motivate me for ministry!

"It is quite true to say that a man who sets his heart on holding office [becoming a church leader] has laudable ambitions." (1 Timothy 3:1 JBP)

Taking a Spiritual EKG

If you are like most people, you have never taken time to sort out and identify the things you are good at and are motivated to accomplish. As a result, it is unlikely that you use these talents as completely or effectively as you could. The key to understanding your heartbeat is to look at your past accomplishments.

This exercise is adapted from the book *Finding a Job You Can Love* by Ralph Mattson and Arthur Miller (Nelson, 1982). We highly recommend that you read this book.

Step 1: List and describe your accomplishments since childhood.

What to include:

- Accomplishments at home, school, work, etc.
- Things you enjoyed doing.
- Things you believe you did well.
- Specific details about what you did.
- Forget what other people think about it!

Examples:

- "I put on plays for the neighborhood kids with costumes, props, etc. We transformed the shed in back of our house into a fairyland with lighting effects, decorations, and princesses."
- "I started a Kool-Aid stand in 4th grade and expanded it into three different stands. It was fun, and I made money!"
- "I had a job as a printer's assistant and developed a method of cutting stereotypes which was faster and more accurate."
- "I ran for president of everything (and sometimes won) when I was in school."
- "I have always liked to build things. Before I got married, I completely rebuilt the little apartment I was living in."
- "I successfully led protest marches against toxic wastes in my hometown and got local TV coverage."
- "I set a goal to read fifteen books over the summer, and I did."
- Remember, you're recalling things you enjoyed doing and did well (accomplishments), not simply pleasant experiences.

Bad example: "I had a great vacation in Canada."

Good example: "I took some stunning photos during my vacation."

• You do not have to cover every year of your life. Just focus on what you feel are the highlights of things you've done.

Remember: These are ALL God-given motivations. They are only sinful when used selfishly. Every one of these can be used in effective ministry. Don't be embarrassed to identify a basic heartbeat that doesn't seem spiritual! Almost every one of these can be identified in the ministry of one of the twelve Apostles.

Serve/help—"I love to assist others in their responsibilities. I enjoy helping others succeed."

Acquire/possess—"I love to shop, collect, or obtain things. I enjoy getting the highest quality for the best "price.

Excel—"I love to be the best and make my team the best. I enjoy setting and attaining the highest standard."

Influence— "I love to convert people to my way of thinking. I enjoy shaping the attitudes and behavior of others."

Perform—"I love to be on stage and receive the attention of others. I enjoy being in the limelight."

Improve—"I love to make things better. I enjoy taking something that someone else has designed or started and improve it."

Repair—"I love to fix what is broken or change what is out of date."

Lead/be in charge—"I love to lead the way, oversee, and supervise. I enjoy determining how things will be done."

Persevere—"I love to see things to completion. I enjoy persisting at something until it is finished."

Follow the rules—"I love to operate by policies and procedures. I enjoy meeting the expectations of an organization or boss."

Prevail— "I love to fight for what is right and oppose what is wrong. I enjoy overcoming injustice."

You should be able to support your choice with examples from your achievements.

SHAPE TOOL 3: Applying My Abilities



"There are different abilities to perform service."

(1 Corinthians 12:6 GNT)

"I [God]... have filled him with the Spirit of God, with skill, ability, and knowledge in all kinds of crafts..." (Exodus 31:3 NIV)

One of the most common excuses people give for not getting involved in ministry is, "I just don't have any abilities to offer." Nothing could be further from the truth. The key is matching your abilities with the right ministry!

FIVE MISCONCEPTIONS ABOUT ABILITIES (SKILLS AND TALENTS)

1. **Myth:** People aren't born with skills. All skills must be learned by experience.

Fact: This simply isn't true. There are a number of skills that seem to be inborn or are developed very early in infancy. When people say, "He just seems to have a natural talent for it," it's probably true!

2. **Myth:** Those skills that must be learned are learned primarily in the classroom.

Fact: Actually some of your most basic skills were learned at home, "on the street," or somewhere else outside the classroom.

3. **Myth:** If you have certain abilities, you will be very aware that you have them.

Fact: Again, this is not true. You are probably using a number of talents or skills that you are not even aware of. You need some process of skill identification.

4. **Myth:** Skills that I use at work are only usable in that environment. I couldn't use them in ministry.

Fact: Not true! Hopefully, by the end of this class, you'll see the fallacy of this idea. Be creative!

5. **Myth:** Most people only have a very few abilities.

Fact: The truth is that many national studies have proven that the average person possesses from 500 to 700 skills!

We believe that abilities and skills should be used in God's service just like spiritual gifts or any other aspect of our personhood. God gave us both spiritual gifts and abilities. The only difference is that one was given to us at physical birth or throughout life (our skills and abilities) while the other was given at our re-birth (our spiritual gifts). All of them, however, can be used by God when we are available to Him! Check the boxes below that indicate special abilities you have used or are now using.
